from the University of Newcastle before studying with painter, Charlie Sheard, in Sydney. Tapia's current practice reflects a passion for surface and the materiality of Renaissance painting methods.

"I find that across many art forms great works have a simple structural core; an unequivocal essence. In painting, regardless of content, to attract visually from afar a work must display an essential visual message.

This goal is accomplished by process; with each brushstroke on the canvas. Therefore an intimate relationship with one's own craft is crucial for an effective embodiment of ideas, and emotions.

Luz Corporea is the result of a long research into natural materials to maximize this incarnation of pictorial intentions. This focus on structure and materials brings an opening up of the subconscious, thus through the process of image making one gives body to the beauty of light and also to one's own inner forces."

Tapia is currently represented by Frances Keevil Gallery, Sydney.
